

## **Project Overview**

Built by NextBridge, a partnership among NextEra Energy Transmission Canada, Enbridge, OMERS Infrastructure and Bamkushwada, the East-West Tie is an approximately 450-kilometre, 230 kV double-circuit transmission line spanning from Wawa to Thunder Bay that was placed into service in March 2022. As the first competitively bid transmission project in Ontario, the East-West Tie represents one of the largest investments in the electricity system in Northwestern Ontario in decades.



### **Project Benefits**

The East-West Tie provides the flexibility and capacity needed to build prosperous communities and support the growth of the mining and industrial sectors by ensuring the long-term reliability of the electricity system. During construction, the East-West Tie provided approximately \$200 million in economic benefits to the region.

### **Indigenous Participation**

The East-West Tie was hailed as a necessary step in building collaborative relationships with Indigenous communities by offering employment and workforce training opportunities through Supercom Industries LP, a 100% Indigenous-owned partnership responsible for hiring and procurement.

- » More than 300 Indigenous community members were trained to work on the project.
- » The Indigenous workforce equated to 51% of the total workforce on the project at its peak.

In addition, the Bamkushwada, a group comprised of the most proximate Indigenous communities, owns an equity stake in the project. The revenue generated by the East-West Tie allows the communities a long-term revenue stream to improve the lives of their members.
